

## Student Routines & Using an Agenda

Another summer has come and gone, and we embark on a new school year. Where summer offered the opportunity for late nights and lazy days, school gives us the opportunity to move into our fall routines. Regular bedtimes, regular homework times, regular mealtimes, and regular relaxation times all add to a stable atmosphere in the home. Routines are important for children as they lend consistency to busy days and give us all signposts around which we can organize our many school, family, and extracurricular activities.

An important way to help your children manage the many demands placed on them is by using an agenda. Agendas are a fundamental tool for your child to be able to organize all their school and extracurricular obligations. Being able to see how due dates of assignments are staggered or when they conflict gives your child the opportunity to plan how they will tackle their work alongside their many other obligations. The weekly view and the monthly view complement each other to give the student the opportunity to plan for the work that is needed to be done alongside all the other engagements they have. With an agenda it is easy to visualize bottlenecks and to be proactive in completing work on time and without the unnecessary stress of last-minute cramming.



If your child does not already use an agenda, please consider how having all their responsibilities chronicled and organized by date can help them prioritize their tasks. A properly used agenda will relieve a lot of the stress caused by homework, assignments, and your child's other obligations. Getting your child an agenda and helping them use it is an easy way to help them manage their demanding schedules and reduce unnecessary stress due to a lack of planning and organization.

Using an agenda - in conjunction with regular routines in the home - will help your children deal with the many different challenges that will come their way this school year. You will be in a great position to offer your kids stability and predictability for a new school year.





## Tips and Tricks for Stress-Free Homework and Lesson Review

School has started, which means homework and lesson review has started! Does your child dread having to review lesson material after finishing their homework? Wish you could make this time at home more enjoyable? At Alloprof, we've got a few tips for you to try.

Your child is ultimately responsible for their own learning, but you still have a crucial role to play. Your encouragement and participation are important sources of motivation.

#### A Few Fun Tips and Tricks!

The more fun your child has when reviewing lesson material, the more productive their review sessions will be. If they lack interest and <u>motivation</u>, they likely won't retain much information. That's why you should try to find an effective review method that's creative, stimulating, and tailored to your child.

For some, it can be to write vocabulary words on a whiteboard or window or trace them on a flour-covered surface or using fridge magnetic letters. For math, you can try to throw dice and add, subtract, multiply, or divide the numbers or use Alloprof's new interactive game <u>Speedy Rabbit</u>. On a computer or using the app, it's a super fun way to practise multiplication, division, addition, and subtraction to become a math pro! Your child can personalize their learning experience by choosing the tables they want to practise, the type of operation, and their grade level.

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# Stress-Free Homework and Lesson Review

For the <u>fidgety child</u> who can't stay put, there are many strategies that can help make homework time a little easier. You could walk around the kitchen table while reciting verbs, take one step forward with every right answer until they reach the other side of the room or act out the story they're reading using only their hands. Handling an object (e.g., ball, paper clip) while reciting their times tables can also help concentrate.

For the more creative ones, you could write songs about lesson topics to remember everything, clap out rhythms when memorizing grammar rules, times tables, etc. or even perform dramatic readings of lesson material for friends and family. Everything is possible, the only limit is your imagination!

#### How Much Time Should we Spend on Homework?

The right amount of time to spend on homework and lesson review depends on a child's needs and abilities, but it can also vary according to their personality, teacher, and environment. In elementary school, the appropriate amount is generally 10 to 30 minutes a day, one to four times a week. This will gradually increase throughout high school and university.



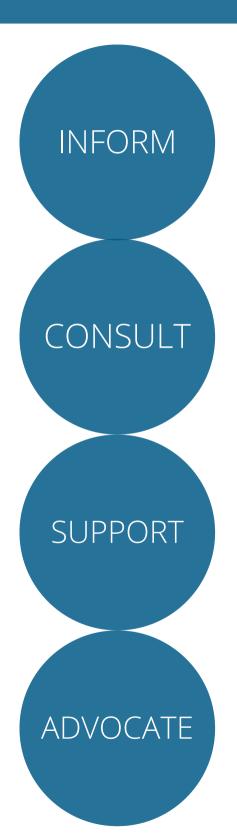
